S.F. nonprofits given leadership grants

Two nonprofit agencies in San Francisco — the Renaissance Entrepreneurship Center and the Women's Initiative for Self Employment — were among seven nationwide awarded Technology for Entrepreneurship Education Leadership grants from Hewlett-Packard Co. of Palo Alto.

The grants, each worth about \$100,000 in technology equipment and cash, are awarded to nonprofit groups that provide

startup assistance, business training, and access to capital and advice to entrepreneurs and small businesses.
